



A Letter from the President

A Centenary is a major milestone in the history of any organisation. Our celebrations are particularly poignant because of Craigengowers' colourful sporting traditions and unique heritage. Many of our early members had family or business links with Shanghai, and participated in club tours and the famous cricket interports of yesteryear. Therefore, it is very fitting indeed for some of our celebrations to be in Shanghai. Last week-end, about 50 of our tennis players were hosted by our good friends at the Shanghai Sports Federation.

Whilst the mainstream of the Club's activities have moved in other directions, I remain proud to be President of the second oldest Cricket Club in Hong Kong, and am especially thrilled our Club is leading the way back to Shanghai after 46 years. I am delighted that Terry Smith, the President of the Hong Kong Cricket Club, formed in 1851, is on Tour in the company of so many who have contributed much to cricket in Hong Kong. I trust he will accept my invitation to start play on this important occasion by bowling the first ball!

The development of junior cricket was the main reason the Club was formed way back in 1894. The important role our Club played in the development of League Cricket at the turn of the Century, and more recently the 6-a-side concept, is well known in Hong Kong. The recent decision to make our Club one of the coaching centres for the Hong Kong Cricket Association's junior development programme is not so well known, but demonstrates a continuing commitment to the game.

To all those in Shanghai who have helped in the organisation of this Tour - a sincere thank you, and with it goes my wish that it will play some part in the re-kindling of local cricketing spirits.

A History of Craigengower Cricket Club 1894-1994

C.C.C. was founded in Hong Kong in 1894, when Mr. W.D. Braidwood, the Headmaster of the Victoria English School, converted a turfed piece of ground into a cricket field, in Bonham Road near Breezy Point.

The cricket was enthusiastically received both by the students and their parents. It was thought that

their activities should be dignified with a suitable title. Mr. Braidwood cast around for a name and finally settled upon the name of the building which housed his school - Craigengower. Mr. Braidwood was also a Scot which probably explains the source of the name.

There was one drawback to the cricket ground. While hitting the ball over the boundary was an easy matter, recovering the ball was less straightforward. The land beyond the boundary was the site of an old cemetery. The students had to recover the ball from amongst skulls from damaged urns scattered beyond the boundary. Not unnaturally, the players did not particularly enjoy this task.

So Mr. Braidwood looked around for another piece of land upon which cricket might be played. At this time, Happy Valley was a large area of open

shield was allowed to be won outright by a certain R. Basa in 1903, one of Braidwood's ex-students and later to become a Club President. Possibly because Club funds could not extend to a new shield, or possibly because it was a good idea, the Club Secretary, Mr. A.E. Asger suggested an open cricket competition on league principles. The President, Mr. Braidwood, convened a meeting on 22 October 1903 which led to the formation of the Hong Kong Cricket League. The Club Secretary, Mr Asger became the first Secretary of the Cricket League. A new local newspaper, the South China Morning Post, donated a shield and a League competition

ground which was used for a variety of sporting

activities, including those of the Hong Kong




Until the Pacific War, C.C.C. was a leading force on the Hong Kong cricket scene. It won the first division cricket championship on several occasions.

Cricket came to an abrupt halt in December 1941. The Club's ground at Happy Valley was taken over by the Japanese as a work site. The ground was used for the shaping of large granite blocks.

After the war, C.C.C. continued to influence the local scene in other ways, with George Hong Choy as the Secretary of the Hong Kong Cricket League from the late 1940's to the early 1960's.

Cricket continued enthusiastically on the Happy Valley ground into the 1970's. Although there was limited success in the various competitions, C.C.C. always performed creditably and produced players who went on to represent Hong Kong. Carl Myatt, John Ashworth, Buji Dhabher, George Souza Snr, Jalu Shroff and Des Greenwood to name only a few.

Unfortunately, in Hong Kong space is at a premium. Sadly, for cricket, one Saturday in early 1977 the cricket team arrived at the Club to find that half the ground had been dug up to a depth of two feet. The last match at C.C.C. was played with half the fielding side dodging round heaps of earth and tripping over lumps of old concrete. Now

C.C.C. boasts 9 all weather flood-lit tennis courts, 2 very fine bowling greens, a spacious badminton hall, a gymnasium, a swimming pool and 2 squash courts - but no cricket pitch. In 1986 however, the Club built a flood-lit practice wicket for cricket, and in early 1994 agreed to be a Coaching Centre for the HKCA junior development programme.

After the loss of the cricket ground, C.C.C. became a nomadic side playing their games on any ground available on a Saturday afternoon. This has meant considerable difficulty for the Hong Kong Cricket Association which is responsible for cricket in Hong Kong. C.C.C. however, is not the only Club to have lost its ground in recent years as development encroaches on more and more open space.

C.C.C. are deeply appreciative of the help and assistance that has been given both by the Association, and other Clubs who still have their own cricket facilities, in maintaining them as a cricket side.


The first 6-a-side Tournament on record in Hong Kong was at Chater Rd. on 23.12.61 and was won by C.C.C. Club Life member, George Hong Choy was then Secretary of the Cricket League, and a Craigengower member, Mr Kuruneru, donated the six tankards to the winners. Shortly before the ground was lost to cricket, C.C.C. inaugurated it's annual invitational 6-a-side competition. The initial competition provided a

good day's entertainment for many teams and spectators. It was ultimately won by Centaurs (originally the Civil Service side which played the first ever league match against C.C.C.)

The competition is now an established and very popular fixture.

As the number of grounds available for cricket dwindles, it is perhaps inevitable that C.C.C's cricketing future is uncertain, but at present in our Centenary year the mood is buoyant and the future optimistic. Enthusiasm abounds as C.C.C. embark on their ground breaking tour to Shanghai - the first by a touring cricket team since 1948.

In conclusion, it is interesting that the Club has been guided essentially by four Presidents, Braidwood till about the end of World War I, R.Basa through the 1920's, B.W. Bradbury until the late 1940's, and Colonel Botelho from the early 1950's till 1991. "Bots" as he is affectionately known led the Club for a total of 38 years, an extraordinary record. 1947, Bradbury and some other members took personal guarantees with the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank to enable the rebuilding of the Club. Perhaps, it is that sort of personal commitment that has helped to develop C.C.C.'s special spirit.


Rod Eddington - aka. "Physics"


Tony Gough

Right hand bat, ex-domestic team secretary. In HK since 1980. HKCC squasher.




Bryan Hemshall - aka. "BG"

Hardened CCC tourist, been on them all. In HK since 1971, ex-HKCC Optimist &


